

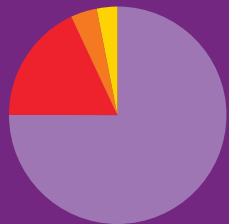

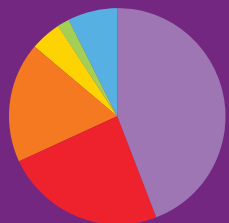

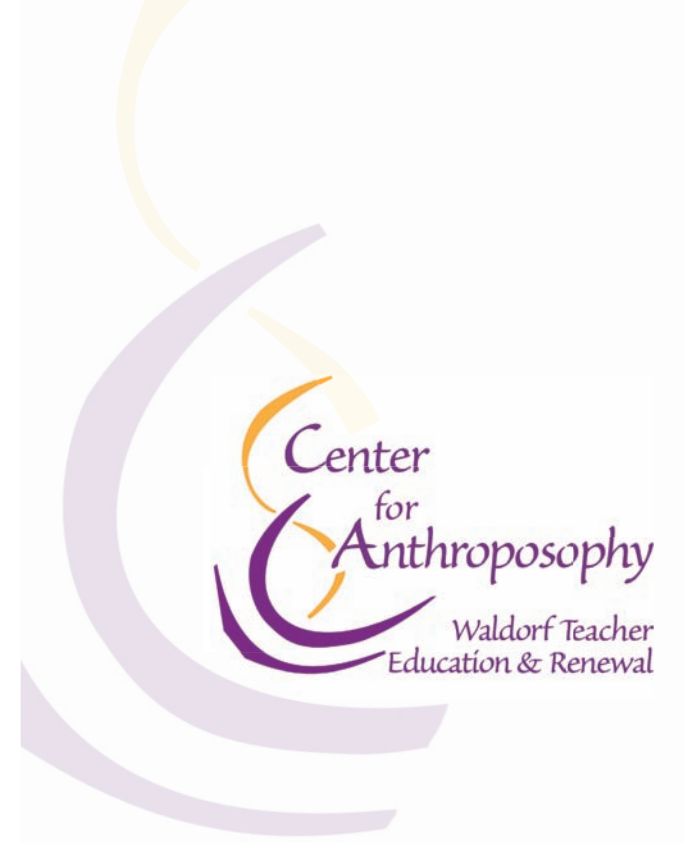

This has been a record-breaking year of "firsts" for the Center:

- ▶ We formed a new Board of Trustees and Pedagogical Advisory Council
- ▶ We unveiled a newly-renovated reading room for the Cadmus Library in the basement of our home building in Wilton NH
- ▶ We sponsored our first public performance of eurythmy, presented by the Eurythmy School of Spring Valley NY
- ▶ We launched Center & Periphery, an online newsletter published every other month

FOUNDATION STUDIES IN ANTHROPOSOLOGY AND THE ARTS

This year we sponsored an unprecedented 8 clusters in Waldorf schools stretching from Maine to North Carolina. In addition, the Center offered individually mentored foundation studies for students across the United States.



These two-year part-time courses are designed to strengthen the communities of Waldorf school parents, trustees, and friends, as well as to prepare teachers for Waldorf training.

RENEWAL COURSES

A record 280 participants took part in Renewal Courses this summer, a 15% increase over the previous year. A stellar international faculty drawn from Canada, Germany, Great Britain, and Switzerland—as well as teachers from California and Hawaii to New York and New England—offered a total of 16 one-week courses, all with lively artistic components.



Renewal Courses help Waldorf teachers—and those who stand with them as administrators, trustees, parents, and friends—to deepen their study of anthroposophy and to rekindle the sources of inspiration in their work with children and adolescents.

WALDORF HIGH SCHOOL TEACHER EDUCATION PROGRAM

Some 30 students are currently enrolled in this three-summer part-time program, specializing in six high school subject areas:

Arts and Art History
English Language and Literature
History and Social Science
Life and Earth Sciences
Mathematics and Computer Studies
Physics and Chemistry

- ▶ 13 new students joined this summer from the U.S. and as far away as Nairobi, Kenya
- ▶ 17 students returned for their second and final third-year courses
- ▶ 11 students graduated from the program, all of them already teaching in Waldorf or public high schools across the country

Currently enrolled or graduated students of this program are presently employed in 35 of the 40 Waldorf high schools in North America, many of them in leadership roles in their schools.

AFFILIATED PROGRAMS AND ACTIVITIES

WALDORF TEACHER EDUCATION at Antioch University New England

The Center for Anthroposophy works in parallel with the Waldorf Teacher Education Program at Antioch University New England in Keene NH. This year over 90 practicing and prospective early childhood and elementary school educators at Antioch were enrolled in a total of 6 year-round and part-time programs.

Of the 36 students graduating this summer, 7 were the first to receive "research masters" from a new M.Ed. program for experienced Waldorf educators inaugurated at Antioch in 2010. In addition, 14 students from Antioch's part-time "Summer Sequence" and 15 from the University's year-round Waldorf program in Keene completed their teacher preparation this year.

CADMUS LIBRARY Color Shop & More

In 2008 the Center purchased a three-story historical building in downtown Wilton NH. An arts store on the ground floor of the building was renovated and re-opened as "The Color Shop & More", offering Waldorf toys and gifts, anthroposophical books and cards, Weleda health products, as well as a full range of high-quality arts supplies.

In 2011, with help from the Cadmus Corporation, the Center renovated the building's basement with new lighting and hardwood flooring to create a community seminar and reading room for the Cadmus Library, a local archive of books and journals related to anthroposophy and Waldorf education.
